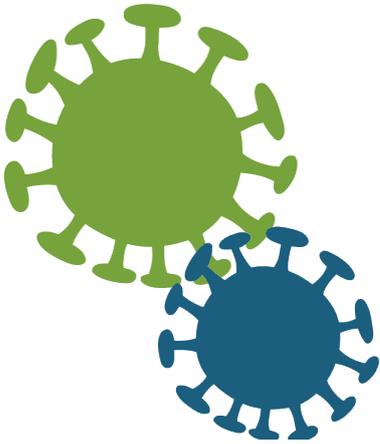




# Beat flu

## Should you have a free NHS flu vaccine?

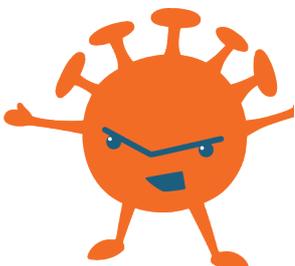


**Flu** is an infection caused by germs. It can cause things like:

- a fever
- aching body
- a headache
- a cough
- sore throat



A **flu vaccine** is a medicine that helps stop you getting ill from flu. It can help stop you spreading the infection to other people.

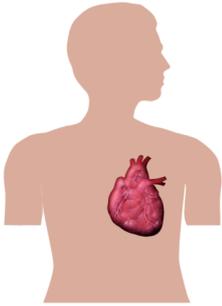


For some people **flu** can be very serious. It is important for them to get a **flu vaccine** each year. Getting a **flu vaccine** is the best way to protect yourself against **flu**.

# Who should get a flu vaccine?



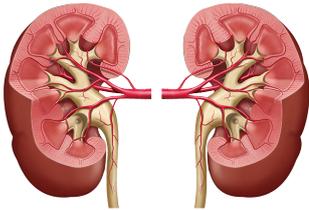
The **flu vaccine** is free for everyone aged 6 months and over who are at risk of being very ill if they catch **flu**. This includes people who have:



✓ a heart problem

✓ diabetes

✓ a chest condition or breathing difficulties including asthma that needs regular inhalers.



✓ kidney disease

✓ a weak immune system

✓ liver disease



✓ had a stroke or a mini stroke

✓ a learning disability

✓ conditions like MS, cerebral palsy or post-polio syndrome



✓ had their spleen taken out, or have a spleen that doesn't work very well

✓ and adults who are very overweight.

## You should also have a flu vaccine if:



✓ You are pregnant

✓ You are 65 years old or over



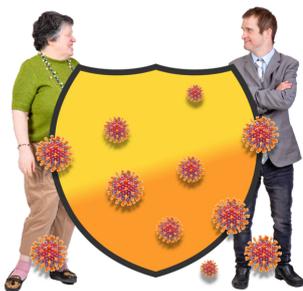
✓ You live in a care home

✓ You are a carer

✓ You are a community first responder. This is a person who comes first to help before the ambulance

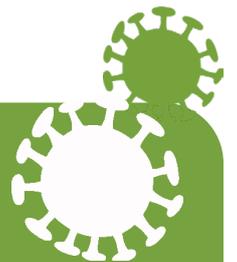


✓ You are an emergency first aider at public events



✓ You live with someone who is on the **NHS shielded patient list** - for people who had to stay at home and stay away from others during coronavirus. Because they were at risk of getting seriously ill if they caught coronavirus.

Most health and social care workers should also have a flu vaccine. Talk to your employer about this.



# Flu vaccine for children

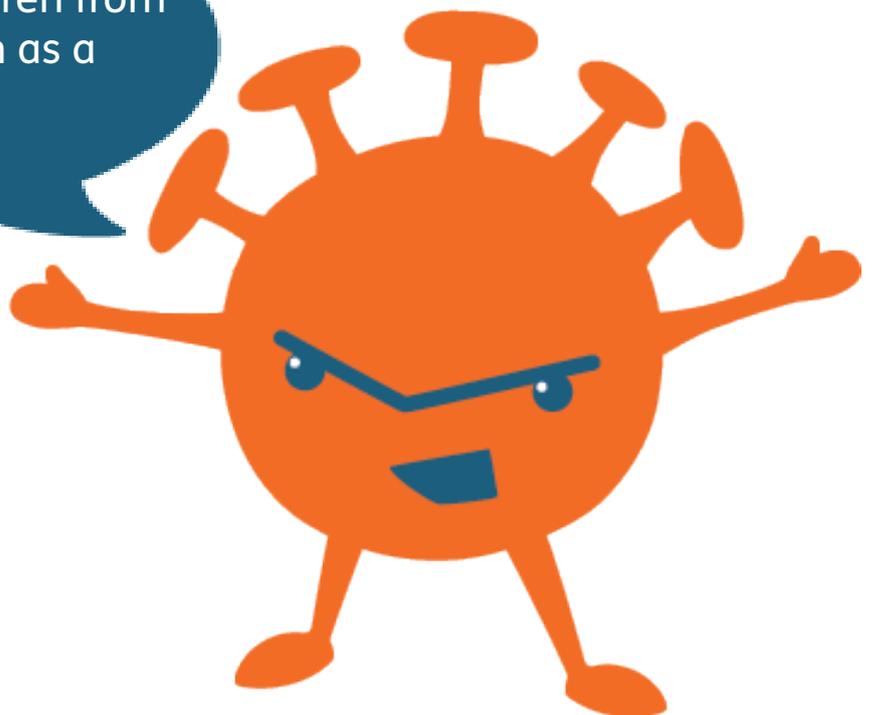


Children aged 2 or 3 years old on **31 August 2020** can get a free **flu vaccine** from the doctor or nurse at their GP surgery.



All primary school aged children can get a **flu vaccine** in school.

Flu vaccine for children from the age of 2 is given as a spray up the nose.

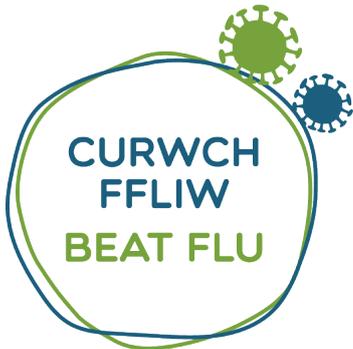
Flu vaccine is the best way to protect against flu. If you are not sure if you can have a free flu vaccine, speak to:
