

PATIENT INFORMATION - SCAPHOID INJURIES

Your scaphoid is a small bone in your hand between your thumb and wrist. It can be difficult to diagnose a scaphoid bone fracture as the break cannot always be seen on an initial x-ray. Sometimes it is not visible for 10-14 days. Because of this it is usually treated as broken even if it can't be seen on the x-ray.

Treatment

Treatment for a scaphoid injury is done by using a scaphoid plaster or sometimes a lightweight splint. You will have been asked to return to the hospital in 10 – 14 days for a check up.

Next steps

The plaster/splint will be removed and the wrist will be examined again. Some patients may need a repeat x-ray and for others, no further treatment is required. However, more tests may be done if the second x-ray is normal but the area is still very sore.

If the x-ray reveals a fractured scaphoid bone, you will need to be in plaster for a further 8-12 weeks. Occasionally surgery may be required.

Recovery

A scaphoid break (fracture) will usually heal well if it is recognised and treated early.
